Royal Navy Commando Assists Celebrated Explorer's Escape From Secret Nazi Military Base

SOUTH POLE — U.S Intelligence learned late yesterday that Peter Hamsun, the celebrated Norwegian anthropologist and explorer, along with his son Bjorn, escaped from a secret Nazi military base believed to be concealed somewhere in Glacier, Antarctica. A Royal Navy commando, known as O'Leary, was said to have been instrumental in the success of their escape.



Officials reported that Hamsun, his son, and O'Leary fled by dog sled and were last spotted traveling across rugged, frozen terrain carrying three crates marked "Streng Geheim" (Top Secret). The Royal Navy is reported to have launched the H.M.S. Victoria to assist in returning the three men to the continent.

Editor Held for Questioning

VILLEURBANNE, FRANCE — Antarctica International Times' Editor-in-Chief, Oliver Mascleff, is being held for questioning regarding the alleged "leaking" of clues to I•Motion's latest hit supernatural thriller "Prisoner of Ice." Inspired by the H.P. Lovecraft novel MOUNTAINS OF MADNESS, "Prisoner of Ice" is based on real life events in 1937.

Mascleff allegedly supplied direct clues to game users by disguising game hints among actual facts in late breaking news stories. When contacted by the press, Mascleff refused to comment and simply stated "the truth will come out, and I will be abdicated!" At the time this story went to press, I•Motion's Chief of Security, Hubert Chardot, was unavailable for questioning.

U.S. Expedition Devoured: New Information on Tragic Deaths of U.S. Expedition in South Pole

Ernst Dietrich Finances New Expedition

MISKATONIC UNIVERSITY, ARKHAM — The 1919 U.S. expedition which was killed near the South Pole by unknown means is now believed to have been brutally attacked and devoured by "monsters trapped in a gigantic stone ice-capped city." He remembered to take the guard's cell key to close and lock the door. "I was never so happy, at that point, to be in possession of my humble little table, stool, and cell key. Without them I wouldn't have been able to reach the ceiling grill which ultimately became my passage out of hell."

This is one cold war prisoner whose story ended happily. He now lives in Southern California with his wife and four kids, and says he spends as much time on the beach as possible making up for lost time.

Vivor says that he sometimes reminisces about his days in international espionage. "There's nothing like the thrill of knowing that at any moment, if you don't act fast enough, you might lose your life. It's kind of like a game," he says, "every second is a new challenge, you're under the gun you've got to solve the mystery, and do it quickly, or you're dead and the game is over! In this case your country is counting on you; make the wrong move and the fate of nations will be changed. It's a thrill you'll never forget."

been rationed, so I offered him a pack of cigarettes that somebody else had left on a desk in the Captain's office. I had spotted the pack earlier and knew that they'd come in handy. I was right. You see McLagen was the kind of guy who you can reason with. We talked a little, I asked him a question, and he was happy to help me out with what I wanted. Call it a bribe if you want, to me it's more like, you scratch my back and I'll scratch yours."

"Oh, yeah, there's one more thing too," he added, "cigarettes are great when you need to distract somebody. All you need is a fire extinguisher, a cigarette, and a trash can. You can start a fire in the trash with a cigarette, hide, and then put the fire out with the extinguisher. All in all, I've found cigarettes to be a big help in life. In fact, I'd go so far as to say that I wouldn't be here today if it weren't for cigarettes."

"I would like to add just one more thing," he added. "I've never actually smoked cigarettes myself. While I have found them to be useful, it's like everything else, you have to use your intuition.
